## MOTOR IMITATION SKILLS!

Children need to IMITATE what we do in order to teach them how to talk.

Early on, the focus is on the actions. Use gentle hand-over-hand assistance to help the child be successful with their actions. Preferred songs and finger plays can be highly motivating for young children. Promotes fun adult-child interactions and encourages imitation skills.

Suggested Motor Imitation Targets:

- Clap hands
- · Blow a kiss
- Bang blocks
- · Fly a tox plane
- · Knock blocks down
- · A-choo game
- · Stir with a spoon
- · Pound a hammer
- · Roll a ball
- · Stomp feet
- Wave
- Knock on door
- · Stick out tongue
- · Push tox car
- · Make tox animals walk
- · Gestures/signs
- · Put on a hat
- Pat a baby doll

Finally, sing songs with hand motions! Songs and finger plays can be valuable tools for developing motor imitation skills.
